From School to Surgery

In issue number 48, we reported on the Architectural Conservation award for Old S.S. No. 2, now the Kanata Plastic and Cosmetic Surgery at 895 March Road. Since then, the clinic has earned the highest accreditation possible from the Canadian Association for Accreditation of Ambulatory Surgical Facilities Inc. This achievement often surpasses local hospital standards.

On August 26th, James and Kelly Lacey held a "Tea at Three" to say thank you to the community which has demonstrated such great support for their conservation of a local landmark. Former students recalled memories of attending the one room (grades one to eight) classroom. Guests were shown how the renovations highlight the heritage features of the floor and stone walls and had an opportunity to chat with architect Ralph Vandenberg. Of particular interest to the Laceys is the remains of a physiology lesson written on the blackboard. This has been preserved as a memento of one of the last classes there in the 1960s. The addition contains the state-of-the art operating and recovery rooms which feature the newest in 21st century technology built to a meticulous standard.
